Ethics

Law Enforcement officers are held to a higher standard of behavior by society, because they are stewards of the public trust and are empowered to apply force and remove constitutional privileges when lawfully justified. They take an oath of office, are expected to comply with professional codes of ethics, and are subject to various laws, rules, and regulations.

Do You Treat Citizens Fairly

- The law enforcement agency and it's members must be viewed as fair if the community is going to consider the department a legitimate authority.
- Fairness is usually defined as the equal treatment of people in similar circumstances. Another definition is that each individual action—or inaction—by a police professional done to a member of the community defines fairness or justice to that individual and, over time, defines what fairness and justice mean to that community.
- The more that people perceive law enforcement as acting fairly or justly, the more legitimate the police function and the individual law enforcement professional becomes.

Risk Management

Risk management's general goal is to prevent or reduce injury to people, property, reputation, and other assets and to remedy any injury or loss when it occurs; training, encouraging and expecting the law enforcement professional to act in accordance with policy and procedures is good insurance.
